'Children and young people across the country have experienced unprecedented disruption to their education as a result of coronavirus (COVID-19). Those from the most vulnerable and disadvantaged backgrounds will be among those hardest hit. The government has announced £1 billion of funding to support children and young people to catch up. This includes a one-off universal £650 million catch-up premium for the 2020 to 2021 academic year to ensure that schools have the support they need to help all pupils make up for lost teaching time.

Coronavirus (Covid 19) Catch Up Programme Government Guidance

We are using the allocated Catch Up Funding to support all of our pupils across school, to enable them to catch up on any loss of learning due to the Covid -19 pandemic. This funding will be used for specific interventions as well as increased expectations within the curriculum delivery. In addition to this funding a carry-over of Pupil Premium Funding from academic year 2019-2020 of £4,300 and an allocation of £3,275 from Pupil Premium Funding academic year 2021-2022 is allocated to this Catch Up programme
